

# CAF Champions League: Boost for Young Africans and JS Kabylie as CAF Sanctions AS FAR After Al Ahly Crowd Trouble

The CAF Champions League has taken another dramatic turn following disciplinary action taken against AS FAR Rabat after crowd-related incidents during their high-profile clash with Al Ahly. The Confederation of African Football (CAF) has officially imposed sanctions on the Moroccan side, a decision that could significantly reshape the dynamics of Group D and offer renewed hope to Young Africans SC and JS Kabylie.

## What Happened During AS FAR vs Al Ahly?

## CAF's Decision and Sanctions Explained
